- f Includes care provided in nursing care facilities (NAICS 6231), continuing care retirement communities (NAICS 623311), state and local government nursing facilities, and nursing facilities operated by the Department of Veteran Affairs.
- g In the 2014 Current Population Survey Annual Social and Economic Supplement, the U.S. Census Bureau implemented redesigned health insurance questions to replace the existing questions in the CPS ASEC. Beginning with 2018 data, data were reorganized and some categories were changed. TRICARE is now listed under Private Insurance, and Military Healthcare has changed to VA or CHAMPVA (Civilian Health Medical Program of the Department of Veterans Affairs). Data for all categories are not comparable to data reported in previous years.

Numbers of hospitals reported in 2000 and 2010 were re-computed according to the new definition from the American Hospital Association's annual survey databases from those years.

- j In 2019, there was a change in the methodology used by the American Hospital Association to produce these data. Community hospitals are hospitals that are nonfederal, short-term general and special hospitals whose facilities and services are available to the public. (Special hospitals include obstetrics and gynecology; eye, ear, nose and throat; rehabilitation; orthopedic; and other individually described specialty services.) Short-term general and specialty childrens hospitals are also considered to be community hospitals. Data cannot be trended for years prior to 2013.
- ${f k}$ Calculated as follows: average daily census/beds.
- 1 There is no single data source for 2000–2022. Data for 2022 include only active physicians. Data for 2000 and 2010 include active and inactive physicians and cannot be compared to 2022 data.
- m Data for the number of registered nurses printed in ACHE's Key Industry Facts from 2012–2018 did not include nurse anesthetists, nurse practitioners or nurse midwives.
- Data reported include all nursing facilities federally certified for Medicare (skilled nursing care) and Medicaid (nursing facilities). Data reported prior to 2018 in ACHE's Key Industry Facts was from a source no longer available and included only nursing homes. Data from the current source are not available from years prior to 2003.
- The number of certified nursing beds per facility is calculated by dividing the total number of certified beds in a state by the total number of certified facilities in the state.

- q The infant mortality rate reported by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for 2022 is provisional. International ranking has been discontinued in ACHE's Key Industry Facts.
